WHAT IS A MULTI-GENRE PROJECT?

A multi-genre project is one large project with many different parts. Each part represents what you know about a topic and extends your thinking in many ways. As a culminating project for the novel, *The Outsiders*, you will create a multi-genre character project containing artifacts related to various elements of the story and one of its characters. Upon completion, your project will present what you know and what you have learned.

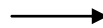
DIRECTIONS: The multi-genre project will be completed in and out of class and is expected to show your best work in the areas of reading, writing, and creativity. This project will represent what you have learned from the novel, *The Outsiders* and from previous lessons on writing, grammar, and the literary elements.

THERE WILL BE THREE PARTS TO YOUR CHARACTER PROJECT:

PART I: CHARACTER COVER

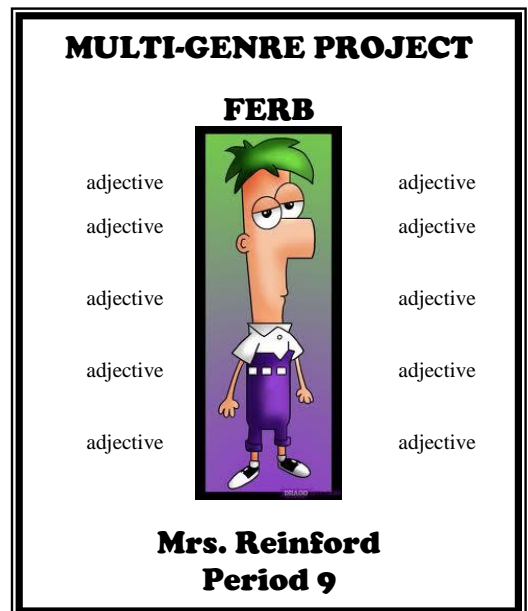
- The cover page for your multi-genre project will be a pictorial representation of the character you have chosen. This page will contain the following components:
 - The character's name
 - A picture of how you envision the character based in Hinton's in text descriptions.
 - A minimum of 10 adjectives surrounding your picture describing the character
 - Project title
 - Your name and class period

- Your cover page should look similar to this



PART II: CHARACTER TRAITS BREAKDOWN

- Using the notes in this packet titled *Identifying Character Traits*, the *Sample Character Traits*, the *Identifying Character Traits Worksheet*, and your character, you will identify FIVE passages from the novel that allow the reader to know something about what or how the character feels, thinks, acts, believes, values, does, or desires.
- **EACH PASSAGE MUST:**
 - Be at least one sentence in length. (Most will be MORE!)
 - Have a page number from *The Outsiders* text.
 - List the character trait the passage reveals about your assigned character.



- This part of the project will take time and thought. You will have a *Character Traits Worksheet* to use as a rough draft to organize your thoughts and ideas. However, how you represent it in your final project is up to you. **YOU CANNOT JUST SUBMIT THE CHARACTER TRAITS WORKSHEET.**

PART III: NOVEL ARTIFACTS

- The last part of your project will contain _____ artifacts related to your character or the novel, *The Outsiders*.
 - From the list below, you will choose _____ ways to show what you know about the character or novel as a whole.
 - Each artifact will be part of your multi-genre project grade and will represent time and quality spent in completion.
 - Each will be fully colored and can be hand created, computer generated, or a combination of the two.
 - Each artifact must be true to the details of Hinton's book. Your artifacts must be free of mistakes in spelling, grammar, punctuation, and capitalization.

What would she say? Who would she talk about? ☉ Must include at least 6 entries of a minimum of 1 paragraph in length.
<p>WANTED POSTER</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ☉ Create a wanted poster for a character in the novel. ☉ This could be from any place in the story and should include a picture, ransom, and who desires the character's capture. 	<p>YOU BE THE PERSON</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ☉ Choose the character in the story that you identify with the most and develop a 'you be the person' presentation. You will come to class as that character and discuss your life and relationships with other characters. 	<p>GONE WITH THE WIND</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ☉ The book <i>Gone with the Wind</i> was important to Ponyboy. Create a PowerPoint or Prezi that shares the plot and main characters of Margaret Mitchell's book/1939 film. ☉ You must include your thoughts on why Pony identified so strongly with this story.

Choose one of the most important events in the story and film a <i>breaking news</i> segment where you interview the characters involved. 	<p>RECIPE WITH INSTRUCTIONS AND PHOTO</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ☉ Chocolate cake is important to the Curtis family. Research a recipe for chocolate cake that fits the description in the book. ☉ Then, present the recipe with a photo like you would see in a magazine. (You can even try out your recipe and bring it in to class!)

<p>CARTOON OR GRAPHIC NOVEL OR MANGA</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Love to draw? Love to draw and write? Create a cartoon, graphic novel, or manga (Japanese style comic) for our story as a whole, part, or alternative ending. Minimum 15 cells/6 pages 	<p>SAY IT IN SONG</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Choose four songs that you think reflect the feelings of Ponyboy as they change throughout the novel. Put all of the songs together to create an audio collage. You must have at least a one paragraph per song to explain why it fits Pony. 	<p>NEWSPAPER ARTICLE</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Similar to the advertisement, create a newspaper and main article describing a reporter's point of view for one of the events in the story. How would someone outside of the story describe it to readers? This must be at least 4 paragraphs in length and be constructed as a newspaper.
<p>ADVICE COLUMN</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Have you ever heard of Dear Abby? Create an advice column in her style with four or more characters writing in seeking advice on a conflict in the story. 	<p>COLLAGE</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Using pictures, letters, and words, create a full-page collage representing events of the story. Pictures can be hand done, computer generated, or cut out of magazines. 	<p>TOP TEN LIST</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Create a David Letterman-style top ten reasons why something occurred in the story.

Identifying Character Traits

Characters do things. They feel things. They hear things. They say things. They think things. They go places. They can walk, run, leap, and jump. They may sit and rock in a rocking chair. They may just lie in bed, sleep, and dream. But the important thing is that characters act.



And these actions show us what kind of people these characters are: friendly, sad, nosey, happy, lovestruck, confused, angry, or inventive.

What is a character trait?

When we talk about a character, we often describe that character in terms of **character traits**, descriptive adjectives like happy or sad that tell us the specific qualities of the character. They're the same kinds of words that we might use to describe ourselves or others, but we're using them to describe fictional characters in something we've read.

The author may tell us these traits directly, but more often the author will show us these traits in action. Our job as readers is to draw a conclusion about the character's traits (*to infer them*) from what the character says, thinks, and does. We might infer a character trait from something a character does only once, or we might draw our conclusions from a series of things the character says and does.

How do we find a character's traits?

An easy way to think about characters is to use a simple chart like the one below. You can start anywhere. There's no wrong way to make your list:

- jot down actions that the character takes then match them with descriptive adjectives in the character traits column.
- list character traits that match your character; then gather a list of actions from the book that support the traits you've listed
- jump back and forth between the columns listing ideas as they come to you; then go back to fill in the matching information for the related column.

For this example, we'll use the character of Harry Potter from *Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone*.
